The program of the study discipline " English language as a foreign language" corresponds to the general educational standard on the English language as a foreign language for foreign students of the preparatory department and the program on the English language as a foreign language recommended by the Ministry of Education and Culture of Ukraine.

Grammar, lexical and communication material is presented to the degree sufficient to obtain a certificate. Intended for teachers, masters, graduate students, foreign students of preparatory departments.

1. Description of the academic discipline

1.1. The purpose of the discipline:

basic language preparation of foreign citizens in English for further education in higher education institutions.

1.2. The main tasks:

in the process of studying the discipline "The English Language", the students should master the content of the main themes of the course and the lexical and grammatical minimum; acquire the necessary language skills and abilities in various types of speech activities for successful participation in further learning.

1.3. The planned outcomes:

- Students should learn to understand and interpret the content of the read or listened text,
- formulate their own statements on topics which are familiar or belong to the sphere of personal interests,
- assess the information received,
- describe impressions, events, dreams, hopes and ambitions,
- give reasons and explanations for opinions and plans,
- to take part in conversation in the set situation based on the general functional language material of educational, everyday, country studies topics.

1.5. Educational and qualification requirements

I SEMESTER

1. Speaking. Monologue speech - the ability to convey the content of the read or composed on the material of a neutral style of speech, the text listened, the logic of the statement, the appropriateness is checked language norms.
2. Dialogic speech - the ability to participate in a dialogue in a programmed situation. Control: the presence of a logical connection of the dialogue, the absence of communicatively significant errors.
3. Listening. Requirements for the audio text: adapted text, playing time text - 10 minutes. The level of understanding of the audio text is controlled by answering the questions.
4. Reading. Texts for reading are built on the basis of the vocabulary of everyday speech style. Working with text understanding of the text is checked by answering questions or retelling the text.
5. Writing. Skills are tested: a) writing a written report on the studied topic; b) retelling the contents of the text read or listened; b) making a plan of the text read or listened.

II SEMESTER

1. Speaking. Monologue speech - the ability to convey the content of a read or listened text, the ability to express one's own views, to build one's own speech expression is tested. Control: logic expression, compliance with language norms.

2. Dialogic speech – the ability to participate in dialogue in a programmed situation. Control: the presence of a logical connection of the dialogue, the degree of understanding of the interlocutor, the absence of communicatively significant errors.
3. Listening. Requirements for the audio text: adapted or non-adapted text, the duration of the text is 30-40 minutes. The tempo of sounding is 180-240 words/minute. The number of submissions is one time. The degree of comprehension of the audio text is controlled by answering the proposed questions or playing the text.
4. Reading. Perception, understanding of the text that the student reads about himself is checked. Texts for reading can be both adapted and non-adapted. The length of the text is up to 2000 words. Reading speed about yourself 150-180 words/min. Working with the text - 15-20 minutes. Understanding of the text is checked by answering questions or retelling the text.
5. Writing. Skills are tested: a) writing a written report on the studied topic; b) retelling the content of the text read or listened; b) making a plan of the text read or listened. Requirements for composing a written story: disclosure of the topic, logic of the statement, compliance of language means with the language system and norm.

2. 7. Teaching methods

Direct method, conscious-comparative method, conscious-practical method, grammar translation method, suggestive method, audiolingual method, audiovisual method.

2. 8. Control methods

Routine control is carried out at each practical class. It is used to check the level of skills and abilities in all types of speech activity. Tests are carried out during a semester: 5 tests in the 1st semester, 2 tests in the 2nd semester. Final control is carried out in the form of a midyear exam and final exam: 1st semester - oral exam; 2nd semester - combined exam.

2.9. Criteria for assessing academic achievement

Tests during the semester are evaluated from 0 to 5 points in the 1st semester and from 0 to 5 points in the 2nd semester (taking into account the complexity of the studied material).

Story topic is evaluated from 0 to 5 points.

The oral exam after the 1st term consists of three tasks:

1. Read the text and retell it. (2 points)
2. Write a story on the topic. (2 points)
3. Conversation on the topic. (2 points)

The combined English exam after 2nd semester consists of two parts - written and oral and takes 2 days.

1) Writing (grammar, vocabulary) (10 points). The goal: check the level of formation of language competence in accordance with the basic level B1. The following skills are tested in a written test: correct use of appropriate forms of the verb tenses, phrasal verbs, collocations, words easily confused, prepositions in a particular context; the ability to use the structure of complex sentences, to ask questions about a certain word. The written test consists of 6 tasks and contains 5 testing points. The duration of the written exam is 2.5 hours.

2) Reading (2 points). The goal: check the level of reading skills and abilities. The objects of control are the following skills: comprehension of the basic information of the text, also some nuances that have important semantic content; comprehension of the essential elements of additional text information. The texts are provided in printed form. The subjects of the texts are related to the social and socio-cultural spheres of communication. Volume of text is 250-300 words (1.5% of unfamiliar words). The test task is to choose the option that corresponds to the content of the text. Reading time is 20 minutes. Test time is 10 minutes.

3) Speaking (3 points). The goal: check the level of proficiency in the ability to produce a monologue, which must contain at least 15 sentences on a given topic. The indicators that are taken into account during self-expression: appropriateness of statement to the given topic; completeness of the topic; independence and argumentation of statements, expressions of one's opinion on the topic; coherence and logic of presentation; degree of mastery of language material and its adequate use, lexical and grammatical correspondence, phonetics and intonation of the

statement; communicatively important and unimportant errors. Preparation of the topic - 30 minutes. Speaking time - at least 3 minutes.

Criteria of statement:

1. Correspondence of the statement to the given topic (- 0, 5 point if statement is off-topic)
 2. Volume of statement (- 0.5 point if statement is insufficient in volume).
 3. Consistency and coherency of the statement (- 0, 5 point for each violation).
 4. Communicatively important mistakes (- 0, 5 point for each mistake)
 5. Communicatively unimportant mistakes (- 0, 5 point for each mistake)
 6. Significant phonetic and intonation mistakes (- 0, 5 point for task)
- 4) Listening (2 points). The goal: check the level of proficiency in the ability to produce a dialogue, ability to participate in a dialogue according to the communication situation (give a reply). Indicators for assessing the level of mastery of skills and abilities of dialogic speech: understanding the communicative intention of the interlocutor, adequacy of speech behavior to the communication situation, achieving the goal of dialogue; adherence to generally accepted norms of speech etiquette; mastery of language and speech material (lexical and grammatical correspondence, phonetics and intonation of expression). Communicatively important mistakes are taken into account. Number of questions for conversation - 10-15.

Criteria of conversation:

1. Adequacy of communication and sufficiency of knowledge, judgment, and skill.
2. Violation of spoken etiquette (- 0,5 point for each violation).
3. Communicatively important mistakes (- 1 point for each mistake).
4. Communicatively unimportant lexical and grammatical mistakes (- 0,5 point for each mistake).
5. Significant phonetic and intonation mistakes (- 1 point for task)
